We welcome anyone 18 years of age or older (exceptions are given by some instructors and listed in the class description) to enroll in our Community Education Program. The enrollment deadline is one week prior to the start of class. Our program is open to the entire community; we encourage residents of other districts to enroll in our classes.

We do not allow walk-in registrations at the class locations.

REFUND POLICY

Requests for refunds must be made in person or in writing and received no later than five (5) school business days prior to the start of the first class. Weekends and days that the school is closed are not considered business days. Make requests to the North Tonawanda Community Education, 176 Walck Rd, North Tonawanda,

14120. There will be a \$7 processing fee applied to all refunds by the district. Please note that refund checks are issued twice a month by our business office.

CANCELLATIONS

If the minimum enrollment is not met for a class to be held, you will be notified by phone or email within three business days of the class start date. You will be refunded for any class cancellations in full.

Emergency closings due to weather or otherwise will be announced on local radio/TV stations. If the school district is closed, then all evening activities on that day will be canceled.






NTI Annual Fall Festival Earth Science Students **Enjoy Beautiful Fall** Day and Lesson

On a beautiful October day, Earth Science students from the High School participated in an outdoor field trip to Niagara Falls. At Whirlpool State Park, teachers Amy Criddle and Thomas Mohring along with their students hiked the Niagara Gorge Trail to get a firsthand view of the exposed sedimentary rock layers as the waterfalls receded through the escarpment. Descending into the gorge, students stepped through 400 million years of geologic time.

The class enjoyed their lunch on the scenic flat rock along the Whirlpool Rapids of the Niagara River. After hiking the trail, students boarded the Maid of the Mist boat tour to observe the rushing flow of water over the falls. Mr. Mohring was excited to bring back this field trip and enjoy this amazing natural wonder with the students. Mrs. Criddle said, "It was a great opportunity for students to bring real world connections to the content they are studying". Student Macy Gabel added, "I loved it! Seeing all of the physical changes in the rocks while in the gorge was so interesting. Woytila Honored by New York State **Theatre Educators**

The New York State Theatre Educators Association (NYSTEA) held their annual Professional Development Conference in New York City, where teachers gathered for workshops and an awards ceremony. In 2019, Mr. Woytila cut the ribbon on a brand-new a state-of-the-art theatre which was built under his vision. He was also instrumental in creating the position of Director of Fine Arts for our district ensuring that Arts education was even more supported in North Tonawanda. Through this new directorship, a Theatre Arts course was implemented and Mr. Woytila now has a direct line for fine arts. Mr. Woytila is also instrumental in the advancement of our Fine Arts Wall of Fame where past students and educators are honored for their accomplishments in the arts. He is also not just a behind the scene's supporter, he has dazzled audiences in some of our High School musicals. He appeared in the local award winning 9 to 5 and most recently as one of the Harvard admissions counselors in Legally Blonde. His involvement shows our students, staff and community his level of commitment and caring for fine arts and more specifically, theatre." "I am very proud of the five year plan we developed for our Fine Arts Center," says Woytila. "Not only is it a beautiful venue for our high school and middle school performances, we made sure to incorporate an










NT Police Donate to | Fall Farm Frolic **Spruce Elementary**


Girls Soccer Team are Niagara Frontier Champions


Little Jack Literacy and Math Labs

At the start of the 2020 school year, Friends of N.T.I. (F.O.N.T.I.) worked with North Tonawanda Intermediate school to determine a need for the campus.
